

Are fiber optic cables restricted in Yemen

Preview

The dispute between the state-owned telecommunication companies, TeleYemen in Sana'a and TeleYemen in Aden, has prevented the activation or the use of the cable which would provide the Internet with a high amount of bandwidth. Multiple reports say several subsea fiber-optic cables in the Red Sea and southern Red Sea near Yemen were severed or damaged, disrupting internet traffic across parts of the Middle East, South Asia and East Africa, and fueling finger-pointing at Yemen's Iran-aligned Houthi rebels even as. The facility connects Yemen to the FALCON international cable, and because of the airstrike, the Internet was disconnected. However, it is still unclear the extent of the damage and how long it may take to restore the service. Regardless of who is behind the attack, Yemen is now isolated from the. The international network consists of three Intelsat (two Indian Ocean, and one Atlantic Ocean), one Intersputnik, and two Arabsat satellite earth stations, and a microwave radio relay to Saudi Arabia and Djibouti.
