

Can the outer layer of cable trays be stripped

Article Overview

Cables installed in cable trays should not have their outer layer stripped, as NEC regulations require durable insulation for safety and compliance.

NEC Requirements and Cable Tray Function

Cable trays are support structures for electrical, control, and communication cables, designed to keep conductors organized and accessible while exposed to open air . Unlike raceways, which fully enclose wires, cable trays rely on the cable's own insulation to protect against mechanical damage, electrical faults, and fire hazards . NEC Article 392 specifies that only Tray Rated (Type TC) or Metal-Clad (Type MC) cables are suitable for open-air tray installations . These cables have robust outer layers to withstand environmental exposure, physical contact, and potential impacts.

Why Stripping the Outer Layer is Prohibited

Stripping or removing the outer insulation of a cable in a tray would:

- o Expose live conductors, increasing the risk of electrical shock or short circuits .
- o Violate NEC Article 392 and 300-8, which prohibit using cable trays for non-electrical purposes or modifying cables in ways that compromise safety .
- o Reduce mechanical protection, leaving wires vulnerable to abrasion, impact, or environmental degradation .
- o Invalidate tray-rated certification, potentially causing non-compliance with building codes and insurance requirements .

Safe Alternatives

If identification or access to individual conductors is needed:

- o Use multi-conductor cables with color-coded insulation or pre-labeled conductors .
- o Apply taping or labeling on the cable exterior without removing the insulation .
- o Ensure all modifications maintain the integrity of the cable's protective layer and comply with NEC standards .

Conclusion

Stripping the outer layer of cables in a cable tray is not allowed. The insulation is essential for safety, code compliance, and long-term durability. Any identification or modification should be done using labeling, color

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coding, or approved taping methods while keeping the cable's protective layer intact .
