- o Ease of maintenance: Wires are easy to inspect, repair, or replace without opening walls .
- o Lower cost and faster installation: No need for cutting into walls or additional finishing work . The main drawbacks are visual clutter and higher susceptibility to physical damage, which can increase the risk of electric shock or fire if not properly protected .

Safety Considerations for Exposed Wires

Exposed wires must be handled carefully to prevent hazards. Key safety steps include:

- o De-energize the circuit before touching any wires by switching off the corresponding breaker .
- o Use a non-contact voltage tester to confirm the wire is not live .
- o Terminate unused wires in a junction box with proper wire nuts and secure the box to a structural element .
- o Cover the box with a solid faceplate to prevent accidental contact and tampering .
