Electrical distribution boxes can be embedded in or mounted on concrete using specialized boxes and conduit systems to ensure safety, durability, and code compliance.

Types of Boxes for Concrete

- o **Embedded Junction Boxes:** These are installed during the concrete pour and are designed to be partially or fully encased in concrete. A two-piece system is common, where the upper box is embedded in the wet concrete and the lower box is attached afterward to allow access for wiring and devices .
- o **Masonry or Concrete Boxes:** Steel or metal boxes designed for direct mounting on concrete walls or slabs. They are robust, corrosion-resistant, and NEC-compliant, often featuring multiple knockouts for conduit entry .
- o **Floor Boxes:** Used in commercial or office spaces, these boxes sit flush with the concrete floor and can accommodate power, AV, and networking devices. They are adjustable before and after the pour and come with durable cover plates .

Installation Methods

- o **Embedded Installation During Pour:**
 - o Place the upper box on the formwork or reinforcement before pouring concrete.
 - o Cover the open end to prevent concrete ingress.
 - o After curing, remove the cover and attach the lower box to complete the junction .
- o **Surface-Mounted or Wall-Mounted Boxes:**
 - o Clean the concrete surface and fill any cracks.
 - o Use masonry anchors or screws to secure the box.
 - o Run conduit from the box to the distribution panel or devices .
- o **Conduit Routing:**
 - o Conduits carrying wires should be positioned on the formwork or tied to rebar before pouring.
 - o Ensure a clear path from the embedded box to the distribution panel or other boxes .

Key Considerations

- o **Box Selection:** Choose boxes rated for concrete exposure and, if outdoors, weatherproof (IP66 or higher) to prevent moisture ingress .
- o **Concrete Strength:** Use structural-grade concrete (e.g., 4000 psi) to avoid crumbling around the box .
- o **Accessibility:** Ensure the lower or exposed portion of the box is accessible for wiring, devices, and future maintenance .

o Compliance: Follow NEC and local electrical codes for box sizing, spacing, and grounding .

Practical Tips

- o Sweep and clean the concrete surface before mounting surface boxes.
 - o Use temporary covers for embedded boxes to prevent concrete from entering.
 - o Verify alignment and level of boxes before concrete sets.
 - o Consider pre-assembled kits for floor boxes to simplify installation and ensure compatibility with devices .
