



Fiber optic signal directly connected to router

To get a fiber optic signal to your router, you need an Optical Network Terminal (ONT) to convert the fiber's light signal into an electrical signal, which is then connected to your router via Ethernet.

- o Most routers automatically detect the connection, but you may need to access the router's settings via a web browser for manual configuration using your ISP's instructions .
- o Check the ONT and router lights: a solid green power light on the ONT indicates proper operation, and the router's WAN light should confirm internet connectivity .

Additional Tips

- o Place the ONT and router in a dry, ventilated area near power outlets, ideally with surge protection .
- o Avoid bending or stressing the fiber cable, as it is sensitive to damage .
- o For larger homes, consider mesh Wi-Fi devices to extend coverage . By following these steps, the fiber optic signal is properly converted and delivered to your router, enabling high-speed internet access throughout your home.
