

How to make a large cable tray

Support and Installation

Use a laser level to trace a straight line for alignment. Mount the tray using brackets or ceiling/wall supports, ensuring it is level and secure. Avoid sagging, which can damage cables or create safety hazards.

Cable Management

Plan cable routes carefully. Use cable ties, Velcro straps, or clips to organize cables and prevent tangling. Maintain proper separation for power and data cables to reduce interference. Leave space for ventilation and future maintenance .

Optionally, paint or label the tray for identification and aesthetics. Regularly inspect the tray for loose connections, sagging, or damaged cables to maintain safety and functionality .
