

Mineral cable trays require covers

Article Overview

Mineral cable trays do not always require covers, but covers are recommended or required in certain environments to protect cables from physical damage, environmental exposure, and to comply with safety standards.

Regulatory and Safety Considerations

Mineral-insulated cables are inherently robust and resistant to fire, mechanical damage, and UV exposure. Because of these properties, covers are not universally mandatory for mineral cable trays. However, covers are often used to enhance protection in areas where cables may be exposed to debris, water, or mechanical impact, or where personnel safety is a concern. The National Electrical Code (NEC 392.6) specifies that cable tray installations must protect cables from environmental hazards, which can be achieved with covers in certain situations. In outdoor or harsh environments, solid or ventilated covers may be used to prevent water ingress, snow accumulation, or wind-related hazards.

Types of Covers

Cable tray covers come in various designs depending on the application:

- o Flat Covers: Economical, suitable for indoor corridors or data centers where space is limited.
- o Dome or Hat-Shaped Covers: Protect overfilled trays and deflect falling debris, often used outdoors or in industrial yards.
- o Peaked or Corrugated Covers: Designed for outdoor use to withstand snow loads and reinforce structural integrity.
- o Ventilated Covers: Allow airflow for heat dissipation while still providing protection, ideal for industrial control panels or data centers. Covers can be fabricated from aluminum, stainless steel, galvanized steel, or composite materials, with thickness and flanging adjusted for environmental conditions.

Installation Considerations

When covers are used, especially outdoors, they must be securely fastened to prevent lifting due to wind or snow loads. Flanges, clamps, and screws with washers are commonly used to ensure stability. Ventilated covers are preferred in high-wind areas to reduce aerodynamic lift, while solid covers may be used in controlled indoor environments.

- o Indoor installations: Covers are optional but recommended for dust, debris, or aesthetic reasons.

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- o Outdoor or exposed installations: Covers are strongly recommended to protect against weather, mechanical impact, and to comply with safety standards.
