Clearance and Installation Requirements

To ensure safety and accessibility, electrical panels must meet National Electrical Code (NEC) standards:

- o Height: The center handle of the highest breaker should be no more than 6'7" above the floor, with the panel installed at least 4" off the ground .
- o Front Clearance: At least 3 feet of clear space in front of the panel is required, and the door must open to a 90-degree angle .
- o Width: A minimum of 30 inches wide workspace is recommended .
- o Location: Avoid placing panels in bathrooms or areas prone to moisture; basements, garages, or utility rooms are preferred .

Practical Tips

- o Keep the area around the panel clutter-free to allow quick access during emergencies .
- o Label each circuit breaker clearly to identify which areas or appliances they control .
- o Ensure all household members know the panel's location and how to operate it safely.
- o If you cannot locate the panel or suspect it does not meet code, consult a licensed electrician for inspection and potential relocation . By following these guidelines, living next to a residential electrical distribution box
